Debate in Canada over ratification of the new North American trade agreement (NAFTA 2.0) is focused on the wrong issue: whether Canada "won" or "lost" the negotiations. That draws focus from the more critical issue: understanding that the new NAFTA does little to protect Canadian business from its greatest threat, namely, a U.S. president who has the ability and willingness to unilaterally and idiosyncratically impose tariffs and threaten trade. 















What to do elsewhere.
